Management and Administration

I. Funding Opportunity Description

Program Overview and Priorities

The FY 2013 NSGP provides \$10,000,000 in funding support for target hardening and other physical security enhancements and activities to nonprofit organizations that are at high risk of terrorist attack and located within one of the specific UASI-eligible Urban Areas. While this funding is provided specifically to high-risk nonprofit organizations under The *Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act, 2013* (Public Law 113-6), the program seeks to integrate nonprofit preparedness activities with broader State and local preparedness efforts. It is also designed to promote coordination and collaboration in emergency preparedness activities among public and private community representatives, as well as State and local government agencies.

Program Objectives

The FY 2013 NSGP plays an important role in the implementation of the National Preparedness System (NPS) by supporting the development and sustainment of core capabilities. Core capabilities are essential for the execution of each of the five mission areas outlined in the National Preparedness Goal (NPG). Delivering core capabilities requires the combined effort of the whole community, rather than the exclusive effort of any single organization or level of government. The FY 2013 NSGP's allowable costs support efforts to build and sustain core capabilities across the Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery mission areas.

Examples of tangible outcomes from the FY 2013 NSGP include strengthening emergency management capabilities through:

- Building and sustaining core capabilities
- Strengthening governance integration
- Whole community approach to security and emergency management

Additional Funding Information

In FY 2013, the total amount of funds distributed under this grant program will be \$10,000,000. Each nonprofit organization must apply through their State Administrative Agency (SAA) for up to a \$75,000 grant award. The FY 2013 NSGP funds will be allocated to organizations established as "Section 501(c)(3)" organizations under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)) and deemed at high risk of a terrorist attack due to their ideology, beliefs, or mission by the Secretary of DHS. Such nonprofit organizations must be located within one of the designated FY 2013 UASI-eligible Urban Areas.

III. Eligibility Information

Eligibility Criteria

The SAA is the only entity eligible to apply for FY 2013 NSGP funds on behalf of eligible nonprofit organizations. Eligible nonprofit organizations are those organizations described under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 that are determined to be at high risk of terrorist attack due to their ideology, beliefs, or mission **and** that are located within one of the designated FY 2013 UASI-eligible Urban Areas, which are listed in Appendix A – *FY 2013 UASI-Eligible Urban Areas*. Eligible nonprofit organizations must provide their applications along with a copy of their organization's Mission Statement to their respective SAA in order to be considered for FY 2013 NSGP funding.

SAAs, in coordination with the Urban Area Working Groups (UAWGs), are encouraged to notify and actively inform eligible nonprofit organizations of the availability of the FY

2013 NSGP - especially organizations that have not previously applied for or received NSGP funding. It is important that **ALL** eligible nonprofit organizations are afforded an opportunity to seek funding.

Criteria for determining eligible applicants that are at high risk of terrorist attack include, but are not limited to:

- Identification and substantiation (e.g., police reports or insurance claims) of prior threats or attacks against the nonprofit organization or closely related organizations (within or outside the U.S.) by a terrorist organization, network, or cell
- Symbolic value of the site(s) as a highly recognized national or historical institution that renders the site a possible target of terrorism
- Role of the applicant nonprofit organization in responding to or recovering from terrorist attacks
- Findings from previously conducted threat and/or vulnerability assessments

IV. Funding Restrictions

Restrictions on Use of Award Funds

DHS grant funds may only be used for the purpose set forth in the grant and must be consistent with the statutory authority for the award. Grant funds may not be used for matching funds for other Federal grants/cooperative agreements, lobbying, or intervention in Federal regulatory or adjudicatory proceedings. In addition, Federal funds may not be used to sue the Federal government or any other government entity.

Pre-award costs are allowable only with the written consent of DHS and if they are included in the award agreement.

Federal employees are prohibited from serving in any capacity (paid or unpaid) on any proposal submitted under this program. Federal employees may not receive funds under this award.

NSGP Pass-Through Requirements: Awards made to the SAA for NSGP carry additional pass-through requirements. Pass-through is defined as an obligation on the part of the States to make funds available to non-profit organizations. Four requirements must be met to pass-through grant funds:

- There must be some action to establish a firm commitment of the grant award on the part of the awarding entity
- The action must be unconditional on the part of the awarding entity (i.e., no contingencies for availability of SAA funds)
- There must be documentary evidence of the commitment of grant award

• The award terms must be communicated to the official grantee

The SAA must obligate 100 percent (100%) of the funds awarded under NSGP to successful applicants within 45 days of receipt of the funds. A letter of intent (or equivalent) to distribute funds is not considered sufficient. Award sub-recipients must receive their funds within 45 days from the date the funds are first made available to the grantee so that they can initiate implementation of approved investments.

V. Application Review Information and Selection Process

Application Review Information

FY 2013 NSGP Applications will be reviewed through a two-phased State and Federal review process for completeness, adherence to programmatic guidelines, feasibility, and how well the Investment Justification (IJ) (project description and justification) addresses the identified risk. For additional information on how IJs are reviewed and scored at the State and Federal level, please refer to Appendix D – *NSGP Investment Justification and Scoring Criteria.*

FY 2013 NSGP evaluation criteria include items such as:

- Identification and substantiation of prior threats or attacks (from within or outside the U.S.) by a terrorist organization, network, or cell against the applicant based on their ideology, beliefs, or mission
- Symbolic value of the site(s) as a highly recognized regional and/or national or historical institution(s) that renders the site a possible target of terrorism
- Role of the applicant nonprofit organization in responding to terrorist attacks
- Findings from previously conducted threat and/or vulnerability assessments
- Integration of nonprofit preparedness with broader State and local preparedness efforts
- Complete, feasible IJs that address an identified risk, including threat and vulnerability, and build or sustain a core capability identified in the NPG
- Not having received prior years' NSGP funding
- Risk profile

Application Selection Process

Applications will be reviewed in two phases to leverage local knowledge and understanding of the applicant's risk of a terrorist attack, while also ensuring coordination and alignment with Federal, State, and local preparedness efforts.

• State Review: Applications, to include organization Mission Statements, must be submitted by the nonprofit organization to the SAA/UAWG (if they are separate entities), no later than 11:59 p.m. EST, June 10, 2013 to ensure adequate time for a State review of nonprofit applications.

The SAA, in coordination with the UAWG, is required to conduct an initial review of all submitted applications from nonprofit organizations to first determine eligibility

based on the established criteria. Once eligibility has been determined, the SAA will review and score compliant IJs using the *NSGP Scoring Worksheet* (see Appendix E- *Investment Justification Scoring Worksheet*) and *Prioritization of Investment Justifications Template (OMB Control Number: 1660-0110/FEMA Form 089-24).* Recognizing the impact an organization's ideology, beliefs, or mission may have on their risk of potential terrorist threats, SAA's must use the provided Mission Statement along with information provided in Section I (Applicant Information), Section II (Background Information) and Section III (Risk) of the applicant's Investment Justification in order to validate the organization type when preparing the SAA Prioritization Tracker.

The SAA is required to provide the <u>scores</u> from the State review along with a <u>prioritized list</u> of NSGP projects. Each application should receive a unique rank. Rankings should be developed based on these two factors:

- Need The relative need for the nonprofit organization compared to the other applicants
- Impact The potential impact of the nonprofit organization in achieving maximum prevention and/or protection results at minimal cost

The SAA should ensure that information noted in the *Prioritization of Investment Justifications Template* accurately reflects the data noted in each organization's IJ. While completing the *Prioritization of Investment Justifications Template*, the SAA should verify the Dun and Bradstreet Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number, System for Award Management (SAM), 501(c)(3) number, and legal organization name. Tracker information submitted by the SAA pertaining to a nonprofit(s) "Organization Type" and "Total Project Cost" will be considered during FEMA's review and scoring process.

- Federal Review: The highest-scoring IJs from each submitting Urban Area will be reviewed by a panel of Federal evaluators. In order to determine the number of applications that will advance to the Federal Review, FEMA will multiply the available FY 2013 NSGP funding by 1.5 (150%). Applicants will then be selected from each submitting Urban Area, based on their State scores, using a top-down approach until the cumulative funding amount *requested* has reached 150 percent (150%).
- Final Score: To calculate the final score, the sum of each applicant's Federal and State scores will be multiplied by a factor of three for nonprofit groups that are at a high risk of terrorist attacks due to their ideology, beliefs, or mission, by a factor of two for medical and educational institutions, and by a factor of one for all others. All final application scores will then be sorted in descending order and awardees will be selected for funding from highest to lowest until the available FY 2013 NSGP funding has been exhausted. In the event of a tie during the funding determination process, priority will be given to nonprofit organizations that have not received prior year

funding and those ranked highest by their SAA. FEMA will use the final results to make funding recommendations to the Secretary of Homeland Security.

NOTE: Upon award, recipients may only fund Investments that were included within the FY 2013 IJs that were submitted to FEMA and evaluated through the Federal review process.

VI. Post-Selection and Pre-Award Guidelines

Notice of Award

All successful applicants for all DHS grant and cooperative agreements are required to comply with DHS Standard Administrative Terms and Conditions available within Section 6.1.1of <u>http://www.dhs.gov/xlibrary/assets/cfo-financial-management-policy-manual.pdf</u>.

Upon approval of an application, the award will be made in the form of a grant. The date the approval of award is entered in the system is the "award date." Notification of award approval is made through the ND Grants system through an automatic e-mail to the grantee point of contact listed in the initial application. Once an award has been approved and recorded in the system, a notice is sent to the authorized grant official. Follow the directions in the notification to accept your award documents. The authorized grant official should carefully read the award package for instructions on administering the grant and to learn more about the terms and conditions associated with responsibilities under Federal awards.

Administrative and Federal Financial Requirements

Grantees are obligated to submit various financial and programmatic reports as a condition of their award acceptance. Please see below for a summary of financial and/or programmatic reports as required. Future awards and funds drawdown may be withheld if these reports are delinquent.

- Federal Financial Report (FFR) required quarterly. Obligations and expenditures must be reported on a quarterly basis through the FFR (SF-425). A report must be submitted for every quarter of the period of performance, including partial calendar quarters, as well as for periods where no grant activity occurs. Future awards and fund draw downs may be withheld if these reports are delinquent, demonstrate lack of progress, or are insufficient in detail. The final FFR is due 90 days after the end date of the performance period. FFRs must be filed electronically through the Payment and Reporting System (PARS).
- 2. Grant Close-Out Process. Within 90 days after the end of the period of performance, or after an amendment has been issued to close out a grant, whichever comes first, grantees must submit a final FFR and final progress report detailing all accomplishments and a qualitative summary of the impact of those accomplishments throughout the period of performance. After these reports have been reviewed and approved by FEMA, a close-out notice will be completed to close

out the grant. The notice will indicate the period of performance as closed, list any remaining funds that will be deobligated, and address the requirement of maintaining the grant records for three years from the date of the final FFR. The grantee is responsible for returning any funds that have been drawn down but remain as unliquidated on grantee financial records. As part of the final report, grantees must submit the Tangible Personal Property Report (SF-428), available at <u>http://www.whitehouse.gov/sites/default/files/omb/grants/approved_forms/sf-428.pdf</u>, to provide an inventory of all tangible personal property acquired using NSGP funds. An inventory of all construction projects that used NSGP funds has to be reported using the Real Property Status Report (Standard Form SF 429) available at <u>http://www.whitehouse.gov/sites/default/files/omb/grants/approved_forms/sf-429.pdf</u>.

Programmatic Reporting Requirements

 Performance Progress Report (SF-PPR). Grantees are responsible for providing updated performance reports using the SF-PPR (OMB Control Number: 0970-0334) on a semi-annual basis. The SF-PPR is due within 30 days after the end of the reporting period (July 30 for the reporting period of January 1 through June 30; and January 30 for the reporting period of July 1 through December 31). Grantees must submit the cover page of the SF-PPR as an attachment to the ND Grants system. The SF-PPR can be accessed online at <u>http://www.na.fs.fed.us/fap/SF-PPR_Cover%20Sheet.pdf</u>.

Grantees will be required to report on progress towards implementing plans described in their application.

- 2. State Preparedness Report (SPR) Submittal. Section 652(c) of the Post-Katrina Emergency Management Reform Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-295), 6 U.S.C. §752(c), requires any State that receives Federal preparedness assistance to submit an SPR (OMB Control Number: 1660-0131) to FEMA. States submitted the most recent SPR in December 2012 thus satisfying this requirement in order to receive funding under the FY 2013 NSGP.
- 3. Biannual Strategy Implementation Reports (BSIR). In addition to the Quarterly Reports grantees are responsible for completing and submitting BSIR reports. The BSIR is due within 30 days after the end of the reporting period (July 30 for the reporting period of January 1 through June 30; and January 30 for the reporting period of July 1 through December 31). Updated obligations and expenditure information must be provided within the BSIR to show progress made toward meeting strategic goals and objectives as well as how expenditures support Planning, Organization, Equipment, Training and Exercises (POETE). The first BSIR is not due until at least six months after the award notice has been received by the grantee.
- **4. Monitoring.** Grant recipients will be monitored on an annual and as needed basis by FEMA staff, both programmatically and financially, to ensure that the project

goals, objectives, performance requirements, timelines, milestone completion, budgets, and other related program criteria are being met.

Monitoring may be accomplished through either a desk-based review or on-site monitoring visits, or both. Monitoring will involve the review and analysis of the financial, programmatic, performance, compliance and administrative processes, policies, activities, and other attributes of each Federal assistance award and will identify areas where technical assistance, corrective actions and other support may be needed.

VIII. Other Critical Information

Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) Membership

In support of the NPG, grantees must belong to, be located in, or act as a temporary member States of EMAC, except for American Samoa and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, which are not required to belong to EMAC at this time. All assets supported in part or entirely with FY 2013 NSGP funding by States, territories and Tribes must be readily deployable to support emergency or disaster operations per existing EMAC agreements. In addition, funding may be used for the sustainment of core capabilities that, while they may not be physically deployable, support national response capabilities such as Geographic/Geospatial Information Systems (GIS), interoperable communications systems, capabilities as defined under the mitigation mission area of the NPG, and fusion centers.

National Preparedness

DHS coordinates with local, State, territory, Tribal, and Federal governments as well as the private and nonprofit sectors to facilitate an all-of-nation/whole community, risk driven, and capabilities-based approach to preparedness. This risk driven, capabilities-based approach is grounded in the identification and assessment of risk through the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA). Urban Areas and States must maintain and update their THIRAs, and States their SPRs, annually to ensure that the community's shared understanding of risk evolves to account for changes in the risk landscape, including successful mitigation efforts, emerging threats, hazards, and associated consequences. Information on the NPS can be found in the National Preparedness System Description (released Nov 2011), which is posted on the FEMA website at <u>http://www.fema.gov/national-preparedness/national-preparedness-system</u>. National Incident Management System (NIMS) Implementation

Prior to allocation of any Federal preparedness awards in FY 2013, grantees must ensure and maintain adoption and implementation of NIMS.

Emergency management and incident response activities require carefully managed resources (personnel, teams, facilities, equipment and/or supplies) to meet incident

needs. Utilization of the standardized resource management concepts such as typing, inventorying, and cataloging promote a strong national mutual aid capability needed to support delivery of core capabilities. Additional information on resource management and national Tier I NIMS Resource Types can be found at <u>http://www.fema.gov/resource-management</u>.

FEMA developed the NIMS Guideline for Credentialing of Personnel to describe national credentialing standards and to provide written guidance regarding the use of those standards. This guideline describes credentialing and typing processes, and identifies tools which Federal Emergency Response Officials (FEROs) and emergency managers at all levels of government may use both routinely and to facilitate multijurisdictional coordinated responses.

Although State, local, tribal, and private sector partners—including nongovernmental organizations—are not required to credential their personnel in accordance with these guidelines, FEMA strongly encourages them to do so in order to leverage the Federal investment in the Federal Information Processing Standards (FIPS) 201 infrastructure and to facilitate interoperability for personnel deployed outside their home jurisdiction. Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation (EHP) Compliance. As a

Federal agency, FEMA is required to consider the effects of its actions on the environment and/or historic properties to ensure that all activities and programs funded by the agency, including grants-funded projects, comply with Federal EHP regulations, laws and Executive Orders as applicable. Grantees and sub-grantees proposing projects that have the potential to impact the environment, including but not limited to construction of communication towers, modification or renovation of existing buildings, structures and facilities, or new construction including replacement of facilities, must participate in the FEMA EHP review process. The EHP review process involves the submission of a detailed project description that explains the goals and objectives of the proposed project along with supporting documentation so that FEMA may determine whether the proposed project has the potential to impact environmental resources and/or historic properties. In some cases, FEMA is also required to consult with other regulatory agencies and the public in order to complete the review process. The EHP review process must be completed before funds are released to carry out the proposed project.

IX. How to apply

Application Instructions

NSGP Investment Justification (IJ): As part of the FY 2013 NSGP application process, applicants must develop a formal IJ that addresses each Investment being proposed for funding. The IJ must address an identified risk, including threat and vulnerability, and build or sustain a core capability identified in the NPG. The IJ must

demonstrate the ability to provide enhancements consistent with the purpose of the program and guidance provided by FEMA. Applicants must ensure that the IJ is consistent with all applicable requirements outlined in the application kit. Applicants will find additional information regarding the NSGP IJ template, FEMA Form 089-24 (OMB Control Number: 1660-0110), in Appendix D –NSGP *Investment Justification and Scoring Criteria*.

X. Application and Submission Information

Content and Form of Application

 Application via Grants.gov. All applicants must file their applications using the Administration's common electronic "storefront" – <u>http://www.grants.gov</u>. Eligible applicants must apply for funding through this portal, accessible on the Internet at <u>http://www.grants.gov</u>.

The application must be started and submitted using Grants.gov after registration in the System for Award Management (SAM) is confirmed. The on-line application includes the following required form:

• Standard Form 424, Application for Federal Assistance

Applying for FY 2013 NSGP funds requires a two-step process. Step One: initial submission to determine eligibility and Step Two: full application. Applicants are encouraged to initiate Step One as soon after the FOA is published but no later than June 17, 2013. This involves submitting a complete Standard Form 424 to <u>www.grants.gov</u>. The Standard Form 424 will be retrieved by ND Grants and the system will automatically populate the relevant data fields in the application. Successful completion of this step is necessary for FEMA to determine eligibility of the applicant. Late submissions to Grants.gov to complete Step One could result in applicants missing the application deadline in Step Two. Once FEMA has determined an applicant to be eligible, applicants can proceed to Step Two which

involves submitting the full application package via the ND Grants system. The submission deadline for the full application package is June 24, 2013.

The application must be completed and final submission made through the ND Grants system located at <u>https://portal.fema.gov</u>. Appendix B – NSGP Priorities

The Alignment of NSGP to the National Preparedness System (NPS)

The NPS is the instrument the Nation will employ to build, sustain, and deliver core capabilities in order to achieve the National Preparedness Goal (Goal). The Goal is "a secure and resilient Nation with the capabilities required across the whole community to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk." The objective of the NPS is to facilitate an integrated, all-of-Nation, risk informed, capabilities-based approach to preparedness. The guidance, programs, processes, and systems that support each component of the NPS enable a collaborative, whole community approach to national preparedness that engages individuals, families, communities, private and nonprofit sectors, faith-based organizations, and all levels of government (<u>http://www.fema.gov/whole-community</u>).

National preparedness is the shared responsibility of the whole community. Every member must be given the opportunity to contribute. The FY 2013 NSGP plays an important role in the implementation of the NPS by supporting the building, sustainment, and delivery of core capabilities. Core capabilities are essential for the execution of critical tasks for each of the five mission areas outlined in the Goal. Delivering core capabilities requires the combined effort of the whole community, rather than the exclusive effort of any single organization or level of government. The NSGP's allowable costs support efforts to build and sustain core capabilities across the Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery mission areas.

Particular emphasis will be placed on capabilities that address the greatest risks to the security and resilience of the United States.

Using the core capabilities, the FY 2013 NSGP supports the achievement of the NPG by:

- Preventing a threatened or an actual act of terrorism.
- Protecting our citizens, residents, visitors, and assets against the greatest threats and hazards.
- Mitigating the loss of life and property by lessening the impact of future disasters.
- Responding quickly to save lives, protect property and the environment, and meet basic human needs in the aftermath of a catastrophic incident.
- Recovering through a focus on the timely restoration, strengthening, and revitalization of infrastructure, housing, and a sustainable economy, as well as the health, social, cultural, historic, and environmental fabric of communities affected by a catastrophic incident.

The core capabilities contained in the Goal are highly interdependent and require us to use existing preparedness networks and activities, improve training and exercise programs, promote innovation, and ensure that the appropriate administrative, finance, and logistics systems are in place.

To support building, sustaining, and delivering these core capabilities, grantees will use the components of the NPS. The components of the NPS are: Identifying and Assessing Risk; Estimating Capability Requirements; Building and Sustaining Capabilities; Planning to Deliver Capabilities; Validating Capabilities; and Reviewing and Updating. For more information on each component, read the National Preparedness System Description available at <u>http://www.fema.gov/national-preparedness-system</u>.

Building and Sustaining Core Capabilities

The FY 2013 NSGP focuses on the development and sustainment of core capabilities as outlined in the Goal. Particular emphasis will be placed on building and sustaining capabilities that address high consequence events that pose the greatest risk to the security and resilience of the United States and that can be utilized nationwide. NSGP uses a comprehensive process for assessing regional and national risks and identifying capability needs in order to prioritize and invest in key deployable assets, as well as those elements that support deployment.

Capabilities are the means to accomplish a mission, function, or objective based on the performance of related tasks, under specified conditions, to target levels of performance. The most essential capabilities are the core capabilities identified in the Goal.

Working together, individuals, government officials, and elected leaders can develop plans to allocate resources effectively and reduce risk. For these plans to be effective, those involved must consider methods to reduce and manage risk as well as how to sustain appropriate levels of capability and address potential shortfalls in order to achieve the Goal.

Achieving the Goal will require participation and resources from the whole community. Not all capabilities can be addressed in a given local, State, or Federal funding cycle, nor can funding be expected to flow from any one source. Officials must prioritize the achievement of certain capabilities to most effectively ensure their security and resilience while understanding the effects of not addressing other identified needs. Building and sustaining capabilities will include a combination of organizational resources, equipment, training, and education. Consideration must also be given to finding, connecting to, and strengthening community resources by using the expertise and capacity of the whole community: individuals, communities, private and nonprofit sectors, faith-based organizations, and all levels of government. Jurisdictions must also use mutual aid agreements to fill needs and work with partners to develop regional capabilities. Ultimately, a jurisdiction may need to rely on other levels of government or partners to address a particular need. This expectation should be communicated well before an event occurs when the capabilities are most urgently needed.

As these issues are considered in light of the eligible activities, the results of an effective THIRA must inform jurisdictions' planning efforts. This risk picture will provide

an understanding of potential consequences from the range of threats and hazards a community faces daily as well as those infrequent events that would stress the core capabilities of a jurisdiction. Coupled with the desired outcomes and capability targets established by a community, this combined perspective is crucial to enabling all levels of government to effectively estimate the level of capabilities required to manage its greatest risks.

Strengthening Governance Integration

DHS preparedness grant programs are intended to support the core capabilities across the five mission areas of Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response and Recovery that are necessary to prepare for incidents that pose the greatest risk to the Nation's security. Each program reflects the Department's intent to build and sustain an integrated network of national capabilities across all levels of government and the whole community. With declining Federal funds available to support these capabilities, disparate governance structures must be integrated and refined to ensure resources are targeted to support the most critical needs of a community based on risk driven, capabilities-based planning. Strong and inclusive governance systems better ensure that disparate funding streams are coordinated and applied for maximum impact.

DHS requires that all governance processes that guide the allocation of preparedness grant funds adhere to the following guiding principles:

- *Prioritization of Investments* resources must be allocated to address the most critical capability needs.
- *Transparency* stakeholders must be provided visibility on how preparedness grant funds are allocated and distributed, and for what purpose.
- Substantive Local Involvement the tools and processes that are used to inform the critical priorities which DHS grants support must include local government representatives. At the state and regional level, local risk assessments must be included in the overarching analysis to ensure that all threats and hazards are accounted for.
- *Flexibility with Accountability* recognition of unique preparedness gaps at the local level, as well as maintaining and sustaining existing capabilities.
- Support of Regional Coordination recognition of inter/intra-state partnerships and dependencies at the state and regional level, and within metropolitan areas.

Program Priority

Advancing "Whole Community" Approach to Security and Emergency Management

Communities are challenged to develop collective, local abilities to withstand the potential impacts of natural disasters and terrorist threats, Through NSGP, nonprofit organizations will be better able to protect against and prevent terrorist attacks. For

Appendix C – Funding Guidelines

NSGP grant recipients and sub-recipients may only use NSGP grant funds for the purpose set forth in the grant, and must be consistent with the statutory authority for the award. Grant funds may not be used for matching funds for other Federal grants/cooperative agreements, lobbying, or intervention in Federal regulatory or adjudicatory proceedings. In addition, Federal funds may not be used to sue the Federal government or any other government entity.

Pre-award costs are allowable only with the written consent of DHS and if they are included in the award agreement.

Federal employees are prohibited from serving in any capacity (paid or unpaid) on any proposal submitted under this program. Federal employees may not receive funds under this award.

The following pages outline general allowable and unallowable NSGP costs guidance.

- 1. Management and Administration (M&A). M&A Activities are those costs defined as directly relating to the management and administration of NSGP funds, such as financial management and monitoring. The amount of M&A is specified in each fiscal year's FOA. M&A costs include the following categories of activities:
 - Hiring of full-time or part-time staff or contractors/consultants responsible for activities relating to the management and administration of NSGP funds
 - Travel expenses directly related to the M&A of NSGP funds
 - Meeting-related expenses directly related to M&A of NSGP funds
- 2. Indirect Cost. Indirect costs are allowable only if the applicant has an approved indirect cost rate with the cognizant Federal agency. A copy of the approved rate (a fully executed, agreement negotiated with the applicant's cognizant Federal agency) is required at the time of application. Indirect costs will be evaluated as part of the application for Federal funds to determine if allowable and reasonable.

3. Allowable Costs

Equipment

Allowable costs are focused on target hardening activities. Funding can be used for the acquisition and installation of security equipment on real property (including buildings and improvements) owned or leased by the nonprofit organization, specifically in prevention of and/or protection against the risk of a terrorist attack. This equipment is **limited to two categories** of items on the Authorized Equipment List (AEL):

- Physical Security Enhancement Equipment (Category 14)
- Inspection and Screening Systems (Category 15)

The two allowable prevention and protection categories and equipment standards for the NSGP are listed on the web-based version of the AEL on the RKB, at <u>http://www.rkb.us</u>. Unless otherwise stated, equipment must meet all mandatory regulatory and/or DHS-adopted standards to be eligible for purchase using these funds, including the Americans with Disabilities Act. In addition, agencies will be responsible for obtaining and maintaining all necessary certifications and licenses for the requested equipment. Costs associated with inclusive practices and the provision of reasonable accommodations and modifications to provide full access for children and adults with disabilities are allowable.

Construction and Renovation

Written approval must be provided by FEMA prior to the use of any NSGP Program funds for construction or renovation. Additionally, grantees are required to submit a SF-424C Budget and Budget detail citing the project costs.

Grantees and sub-grantees must submit all documentation resulting from that review to GPD prior to submitting materials for EHP review. Grantees and sub-grantees are also encouraged to have completed as many steps as possible for a successful EHP review in support of their proposal for funding (e.g., coordination with their State Historic Preservation Office to identify potential historic preservation issues and to discuss the potential for project effects, compliance with all state and EHP laws and requirements). Projects for which the grantee believes an Environmental Assessment (EA) may be needed, as defined in 44 CFR 10.8 and 10.9, must also be identified to the FEMA Program Analyst within six months of the award and completed EHP review materials must be submitted no later than 12 months before the end of the period of performance. EHP review packets should be sent to <u>apdehpinfo@fema.gov</u>.

NSGP Program grantees using funds for construction projects must comply with the *Davis-Bacon Act* (40 U.S.C. 3141 *et seq.*). Grant recipients must ensure that their contractors or subcontractors for construction projects pay workers employed directly at the work-site no less than the prevailing wages and fringe benefits paid on projects of a similar character. Additional information, including Department of Labor (DOL) wage determinations, is available from the following website: *http://www.dol.gov/compliance/laws/comp-dbra.htm*.

Training

Nonprofit organization security personnel may only use NSGP funds to attend security-related training courses and programs within the United States. Allowable training-related costs under the NSGP are limited to attendance fees for training, and related expenses, such as materials, supplies, and/or equipment. Overtime, backfill, and/or travel expenses are not allowable costs. Allowable training topics are limited to the protection of critical infrastructure key resources, including physical and cyber security, target hardening, and terrorism awareness/employee preparedness. Training conducted using NSGP funds must address a specific threat and/or vulnerability, as identified in the nonprofit's IJ. Training should provide

the opportunity to demonstrate and validate skills learned, as well as to identify any gaps in these skills. Any training or training gaps, including those for children and individuals with disabilities or access and functional needs, should be identified in the AAR/IP and addressed in the training cycle.

Proposed attendance at training courses and all associated costs leveraging the NSGP must be included in the nonprofit organization's IJ.

- **4. Unallowable Costs.** The following projects and costs are considered **ineligible** for award consideration:
 - Hiring of Public Safety Personnel
 - General-use Expenditures
 - Overtime and Backfill
 - Initiatives that do not address the implementation of programs/initiatives to build prevention and protection-focused capabilities directed at identified facilities and/or the surrounding communities
 - The development of risk/vulnerability assessment models
 - Initiatives that fund risk or vulnerability security assessments or the development of the IJ
 - Initiatives in which Federal agencies are the beneficiary or that enhance Federal property
 - Initiatives which study technology development
 - Proof-of-concept initiatives
 - Initiatives that duplicate capabilities being provided by the Federal government
 - Organizational operating expenses
 - Reimbursement of pre-award security expenses


